LINE STREETS

Stepping forward from the steps of the church, Chaplain Vincent H. Ehinger spoke, "We good people have gathered here to pay our last respects to these young boys who gave their lives to protect property. Their death is sad but doubly sad for their parents and loved ones thousands of miles across the continent."

TAPS SOUNDED

After speaking for several minutes, Chaplain Ehinger led the entire assembled group and the Lord's Prayer was repeated in unison. Taps were then sounded. Standing on the steps at the church was Captain George Seitz of Camp Paradise, Lieutenant Anton Keszycski of Camp Golconda, Director of Toiyabe forest Alexander McQueen, Assistant Toiyabe Director C. Jefferson and Winnemucca clergyman, Father Francis Mikula of St. Paul's Catholic church, Father Leo B. DeMare of the Church of St. Mary, the Virgin, Reverend Howard Hill of the Methodist church and Father Donald Carmody of the Catholic church in Lovelock.

Following the completion of the services at the church, the procession headed by a color guard from Company "F", 115th Engineers, Nevada National guard, and moved north on Melarkey street, east on Third street, south on Bridge street and west on Railroad street to the Southern Pacific depot.

RANKS FORM

Two ranks of CCC youths were then formed along the tracks as the train pulled in at 10:15 o'clock.

Accompanying the bodies were Assistant Leader David Palatsky of Camp Paradise, who will attend the bodies of Barker, Kennedy, Vitale and James to their New York City homes, while Richard Tippin accompanied the body of his brother, Ernest Tippin, at government expense to his home at Oswego, Kan. Howard, who has been in Winnemucca for the past several years and a brother of the burned youth, left Monday by bus for the Kansas home. Ernest Tippin was project assistant at Camp Paradise.

The CCC youths remained in rank until the train, carrying the bodies, had left.

Government investigation of the disaster continued today with another forest service official expected to arrive today by plane from Washington, D. C. M. B. Rise, assistant regional forester from Ogden, Utah, and A. D. Molohon, chief of range improvements of the division of grazing with headquarters in Washington, D. C., arrived Sunday to begin the investigation.
