

LOG OF MOUNT DESERT ISLAND FIRE

**REGION ONE OFFICE
RICHLAND, VIRGINIA
(October 21 - 30, 1947)**

OCTOBER 21

- 5:00 p.m. Superintendent Hadley telephoned Mr. T. J. Allen regarding a bad fire burning toward Sargent Mountain from outside Acadia National Park.
- 5:15 p.m. Associate Regional Director Cox informed of fire by Mrs. Allen. Mr. Cox called Savage and discussed action to be taken.
- 5:40 p.m. In telephone conversation with Superintendent Hadley Savage was informed that sufficient equipment and manpower was available for the existing situation but that someone from the Regional Office was needed to share responsibility and help generally to direct suppression activities.
- 5:55 p.m. Savage contacted Regional Forester Arnold at Smooth Cave and discussed the situation with him. It was decided that Foresters Savage and Moore would fly to Acadia. This was arranged by Savage for departure at 8:00 a.m. October 22.
- 7:00 p.m. Savage contacted Forester Smith at the latter's home and arranged for him to serve in the Regional Office until further notice.
- 7:15 p.m. Savage advised Moore of problem and plans for departure to Acadia.
- 7:20 p.m. Savage advised Cox that two plane reservations had been made and that he and Moore would leave on 8:00 a.m. plane arriving Bangor 11:00 a.m. October 22 and that Smith would serve in Regional Office.

OCTOBER 22

- 8:20 a.m. Foresters Savage and Moore left by plane scheduled to arrive at Bangor, Maine about 11:30 a.m.
- 8:30 a.m. Mr. Cox reported to Mr. Lemaray (unable to contact Chief Forester Coffman).
- 11:00 p.m. Savage telephone Mr. Cox requesting four supervisory personnel, capable crew foremen and Assistant Chief Forester Cook from the Director's Office. Cox discussed sources with Smith and dispatched messages to Ivan Ellsworth at Saratoga, Hal Foster at Canaan Mills, and Superintendent Freeland at Shumardie.
- 11:15 p.m. Smith telephoned Assistant Chief Forester L. F. Cook at his home. Mr. Cook stated that he would be ready to go on further notice.

October 22 - 27 record compiled by R. W. Smith from notes taken by the several persons who gave attention to fire business in the Region One Office.

OCTOBER 23

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- 8:35 a.m. In telephone conversation with Mr. Cox, Ellsworth reported serious situation at Saratoga and was advised to remain there.
- 8:40 a.m. In telephone conversation Foster stated he would go immediately to Acadia.
- 9:00 a.m. Superintendent Hadley contacted. Advised situation at the moment favorable. Wind from southwest, however, predicted to rise and change to northwest in pm. Experienced crew foreman needed. About 1000 men fighting fire.
- 9:10 a.m. In telephone conversation Chief Ranger Gibbs of Shenandoah stated that Ranger L. V. Berg with three crew foremen left Shenandoah by car for Washington at about 8:15 a.m. Wirth had been requested to obtain plane reservations for them to Bangor, Maine.
- 9:40 a.m. Coffman informed Regional Office that Wirth had arranged for a Navy plane to fly Larry Cook and the Shenandoah foremen to the fire.
- 12:00 noon Report from Acadia noted little change in situation. Report from Acadia advised brisk northwest wind driving fire toward Hulls Cove. Park fire line from about center west shore Eagle Lake follow carriage road to Gilmore Meadow; thence north to Aunt Betty Pond being mapped up by seventy men. Forty men making direct attack on fire line west of Aunt Betty Pond. Town crews working to stem advance of fire toward Hulls Cove. Lake wood area may be lost.

OCTOBER 24

- 1:00 a.m. Foster telephoned Smith at latter's home stating that 45 miles an hour wind has taken fire out of control on all fronts; that village of Bay Harbor was burning along Mount Desert Street and whole situation was in a state of confusion. Additional help not requested in this conversation. Savage having advised that no additional help be dispatched at this time.
- 7:00 a.m. By phone Smith informed Mr. Allen of message received from Foster.
- 8:35 a.m. Cox called Ellsworth at Saratoga and advised him to be prepared to go to Acadia.
- 9:45 a.m. Telephone contact established with Acadia. Report stated need for twenty supervisory personnel and equipment including six power saws, up to ten portable power pumps, twenty miles of 1½ inch hose, one hundred backpack pumps, all to be supplied as rapidly as possible by air. Regional Forester Arnold and Forester Walker desired if available. Approval of expenditure of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) was also requested and approved. Report of the fire front was made and recorded on a map. In telephone contact with the following areas, at intervals up to 4 p.m., arrangements were made to dispatch twenty men: Blue Ridge Parkway - Chief Ranger Campbell, Park Warden Luck and one other; Colonial - Park Ranger Ernest L. Bright, Jr.; Great Smoky Mountains - Park Wardens Price and Gingier, and Foreman during Mammoth Cave - Chief Park Ranger Granville E. Liles, Park Ranger Eugene De McLearn, Maintenance

Ferguson, L. D. Reynolds, Laborers J. T. Hall and C. L. Sanders; Perry's Victory - Custodian J. R. Prentiss (by telegram); Saratoga - Custodian I. J. Hillsworth; Shannondough - Chief Ranger E. F. White, Ranger J. L. Van Soden, and three others. Contact with the War Assets Administration in Richmond, Virginia made four power saws available for immediate delivery; 7 Pacific portable power pumps located at Norfolk (later found to be unavailable).

10:30 a.m. Mr. Allen called Director Wirth, with Mr. Coffman on line also, a report of conditions and activities was made. Mr. Wirth urged that special attention be given to coordination of the fire control operation under a clearly established fire boss. Wirth and Coffman stated that the Director's Office will arrange for transport of men and equipment. List of needed equipment was given and they agreed to try to locate it.

12:45 p.m. Superintendent Rockfellow, called by Mr. Cox, offered to send five and least two other qualified fire crew foremen by plane from Fort Knox to Washington if the Army authorities would provide plane service. At 2:00 p.m. Rockfellow advised that five qualified fire control supervisors were being dispatched by Fort Knox Army planes to Washington. Mr. Chorley's assistant, Mr. Poyer, was informed that Mr. Rockefeller's estate was not yet burned. Telephone call by T.J.A.

3:00 p.m. Mr. Coffman advised that the Director's Office had located 10 miles of hose and 100 back-pack pumps. Procurement and dispatch to Aenolia were requested. Mr. Wirth stated that arrangements had been made for Army planes to fly men and equipment to Aenolia and that schedule of arrival of men in Washington was needed. In a later telephone conversation Wirth and Coffman were informed of scheduled arrival of NPS supervisory personnel in Washington. Wirth gave the scheduled Army flights for these men: One plane from Andrews Field at 5:30 a.m. to take 10 NPS personnel, in addition to 10 USFS Region 8 qualified fire control personnel who would board the plane at 1:30 a.m. in Atlanta, Georgia; a second plane to take the balance of the NPS personnel and equipment, leaving from Bolling Field about 7:00 a.m. Arrangements for quartering personnel in Washington were being made. The Director's Office was informed that Jim Myers was enroute to Washington with the four gasoline power saws. That Office advised that it was arranging for 20 miles of hose to be flown to New Field (Ranger) from Newport and for six power pumps from a point in Wisconsin.

4:30 p.m. Regional Forester Arnold telephoned a second time advising that he will fly from Knoxville to Washington if possible; otherwise, he will fly direct to Ranger, Maine, arriving 11:30 a.m., October 25.

6:30 p.m. From Aenolia Forester Savage reported little change in the fire front, not controlled. Savage is fire boss with Superintendent Hadley and Assistant Chief Forester Cook serving in a fully integrated and coordinated organization. About one-fourth of Bar Harbor reported burned, superintendent's house and Old Barn escaped.

OCTOBER 24

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5:45 p.m. The Director's Office was informed of report from Acadia. Information regarding arrangements for personnel and equipment was exchanged.

7:00 p.m. Mr. Allen was informed by the Washington Office that four Army planes were enroute to Dow Field, Bangor, Maine, with 114,000' of hose from Newport and 100 backpack pumps from Schenectady, New York, scheduled to arrive tonight; that six Pacific Marine portable power pumps would reach Dow Field at 8:10 p.m. Saturday night; that head-lights would be at Concord, New Hampshire, at noon Saturday, and could be obtained through the Forest Service at Laconia, New Hampshire; also that portable power pumps were being flown to Bartlett, New Hampshire by the Forest Service and would be available if needed. Smith relayed this information to Captain Bentham, Dow Field, who said the Adjutant's Office at Dow Field had radio contact with Mr. Savage and would give the message to him and receive the hose and arrange to truck it to Acadia National Park.

OCTOBER 25

Washington Office advised that Army planes got off with fire control personnel and equipment, as follows: 1 from Andrews Field at 8:34 a.m. with 11 FPO men in charge of Chief Ranger Gibbs of Shenandoah, and 10 U.S. Forest Service personnel (1 forest supervisor, several assistant supervisors, and several forest rangers); 2 from Bolling Field at 7:07 a.m. with 7 FPO men, including Regional Forester Arnold, 4 power hoses, 1 power pump, 64 head-lights. The planes which transported hose from Newport were able to take on only about 12 miles. Mr. Caffin suggested that reports from Acadia to the Director's Office by radiogram might be helpful if they could be conveniently arranged.

10:30 a.m. (approximately) Report from Acadia. Fire front is little changed, southwest wind favoring control but fire still out of control, spreading westward on line from Cadillac Mountain to Eagle Crag. Organization is established with three sectors, four sectors planned upon arrival of more overhead. Two observation flights daily have been arranged by Army. Army provides men on requisition, 230 now, 400 for tonight. Phone connections to sectors are being provided by Army Signal Corps. Hal Foster and all Camden Hills equipment are in service at Acadia. Current situation considered safe at this time. Equipment has been rolling in satisfactorily. The balance of the hose from Newport is needed as water is most effective and a hose line to the top of Cadillac Mountain is planned. The backpack pumps have not arrived, and are needed; 60 have been purchased locally.

11:20 a.m. (approximately) Mr. Allen informed the Director's Office of Acadia's report. Requested that the balance of the hose from Newport be flown to Acadia. An afternoon report to Mr. Allen at home gave little change in the situation. The reinforcements had arrived.

Reports from Acadia to Mr. Allen indicated little change, progress being made in establishing control.

OCTOBER 27

- 7:15 a.m. (Approximately) Advice from Acadia to Mr. Allen.
 7:40 a.m. Mr. Allen informed Smith that arrangements were made for Mr. Allen and Mr. Coffman to fly to Acadia, via Army plane leaving Bolling Field about 8 a.m. with Mr. Coffman, stopping at Richmond for Mr. Allen. Acadia reported that a pump be flown in. Smith telephoned Chequamegon RRA and arranged with Mr. Neigard for a power pump to be prepared and delivered to the Operations Office at Bolling Field for shipment on the plane with Mr. Coffman. Sgt. Kiecher at that office was contacted and asked to hold the plane until the pump was delivered. During the morning telephone conversations with Savage at Acadia it was disclosed that the six power pumps from Wisconsin and much of the hose had not been received. Walker checked with Army officials in Washington and relayed information that delivery had been completed to Dow Field. Further checking at Acadia disclosed that the pumps and hose had gotten into other hands; the equipment was later located and obtained, fulfilling the need for that type.
- 11:00 a.m. (Approximately) Savage asked for 100 topographic maps of Acadia NF and Vicinity, 1942 edition, 500 Pulaski tools, and later (11:45 a.m.), 1000 flashlight batteries. These requests were transmitted to the Director's Office which arranged for delivery. The Pulaskis were to be flown from Spokane, Washington, U.S. Forest Service warehouse, and would not arrive until Tuesday night.
- 1:30 p.m. Plane with Mr. Coffman and Mr. Allen left Richmond for Acadia with one pump aboard.
- 3:40 p.m. Report from Acadia stated good progress, the six pumps and hose located, situation favorable, southerly wind. Area burned: total approx. 20 sq. mi. or 15,560 acres; inside park approximately 16 sq. mi. or 10,240 acres; fire line now 24.25 mi. Savage was informed that batteries and maps should arrive Dow Field around 9:30 p.m., Pulaski tools Tuesday evening.
- 4:00 p.m. Director's Office was informed of Acadia's report.
- 4:45 p.m. Acadia reported fire declared under control at 4:40 p.m. This news was immediately relayed to the Director's Office.

OCTOBER 28

- 8:30 a.m. Mr. Allen called saying that the fire is under control and they are now mopping up. Everyone all right. He requested that we send them 3 pick-up trucks and one dump truck. They need them quickly and badly. He instructed us to have ten men alerted in Legion Two to be ready to go to Acadia at once in case of emergency there again. He wanted these men to be those who are experienced in water pumping, etc. We should also have Ralph Shaver, Gurney, and Campbell alerted at Great Northern in case of an emergency at Acadia.

- 9:00 a.m. Mr. Cox called Mr. Wirth in Washington asking them if they could get the trucks to Acadia through Procurement. Mr. Wirth said he would see what he could do. He also said he would have the men in Region Two alerted.
- 9:30 a.m. Mr. Little called Superintendent Blair Ross at Great Smokies and requested that he alert Ralph Shaver, County and McCampbell. Capt. Ross said he would do this.
- 11:00 a.m. Mr. Wirth called and said he had located the trucks at Somerville, Massachusetts and thought he could get them. He would let us know more later.
- 12:15 p.m. Superintendent Ross called and said that County would rather not fly and asked if it would be okay to substitute Merrill instead. It was agreeable to us so Merrill was alerted instead of County.
- 1:10 p.m. Mr. Wirth and Mr. Walker called and said that they could not get the trucks until Thursday and advised us to try to get the trucks somewhere else. He also said that he had six men alerted at Yellowstone and six at Glacier National Park. Mr. Walker asked Mr. Cox if he knew the cause of the fire. Mr. Cox said he did not. Mr. Walker advised that he ask that question the next time he talked to Acadia.
- 1:45 p.m. Mr. Cox called Mr. Palmer at Vanderbilt Mansion and asked him if he could send trucks to Acadia. He said he would send his dump truck and two pick-ups and have them on the way as soon as possible. Would wire us when they were on the way.
- 1:50 p.m. Mr. Cox called Mr. Small at Salem Maritime National Historic Site and asked him if he could send a truck. He said his truck was rather old and the man who drives it was off today but he would try to round him up and have him on his way. Would wire us when he was on his way.
- 2:00 p.m. Mr. Cox called Acadia and talked to Mr. Savage and Mr. Allen. Mr. Savage said he would rather have the new trucks even if they had to wait until Thursday to get them. He said that the Air Corps would stay with them until Saturday. He said they needed something now so they wouldn't have to do any repairing. They were having trouble with broken down equipment now. Mr. Allen wanted to know what kind of estimate the Director wants regarding the fire. They had no statement to make as to the cause of the fire.
- 2:20 p.m. Mr. Cox called Vanderbilt Mansion and talked to Mr. Aaron. The trucks were ready to leave but Mr. Cox told them to hold everything until they heard further from us.
- 2:20 p.m. Mr. Little called Mr. Small at Salem Maritime and told him to hold up his truck going to Acadia.
- 2:30 p.m. Mr. Cox called Mr. Wirth in Washington and told him to go ahead on the new trucks. Mr. Wirth asked if they could use a stake body truck instead of a dump truck. He wanted to know where they would get the cash to pay for the trucks. Mr. Cox was under the impression it would be paid out of the Acadia appropriation. Mr. Allen had said "Don't be foolish" Mr. Smith asked Mr. Wirth what kind of estimate they wanted regarding the fire. Mr. Wirth said they wanted a complete estimate of everything.

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and the more detailed the better. He said they needed to have as detailed an estimate as possible while the "iron is hot" in order to get funds replaced. He said he would call us back when he had something definite on the trucks.

4:05 p.m. Mr. Wirth called from Washington. He advised that he had purchased 5 pick-up trucks (1 ton) and one stake body truck, Purchase Order C-37618, at Somerville, Massachusetts. Man to contact is Mr. Fred Bergman, Ford Motor Company, 153 Middlesex Avenue, Somerville, Massachusetts. They are to be ready on Thursday morning, but if the men showed up on Wednesday Mr. Wirth believed we could get them then. Mr. Cox advised that they had no statement to make as to cause of fire.

OCTOBER 29

4:15 p.m. Superintendent Ross called from the Great Smokies and said that their three men had reservations on the 6:15 plane out of Knoxville. He wanted to know if the men should stand by.

4:20 p.m. Mr. Cox again talked to Mr. Savage. He was pleased to know about the new trucks. He said they had had a busy day and the fire was still going but was checked. They had hopes of rain by Thursday. He said they hadn't heard about the Pulaski tools but should get them in the late afternoon sometime.


4:45 p.m. Mr. Cox called Mr. Small and told him about the trucks. Mr. Small was familiar with the location of the Ford plant and promised to contact Custodian Gerry at Tuscarora and he and his man from Salem would each drive a truck to Roanoke. He said he would get a fourth man to drive one of the trucks. He will wire us when they are en route.

OCTOBER 29

5:56 p.m. Mr. Allen, speaking from Roanoke, stated that the Pulaski tools had not yet arrived, that George Miller in Washington had been informed and would follow up. There are 120 men on fire lines today. The supervisory personnel in Legion Two and Smokies should remain on standby. A little rain fell at Roanoke.

OCTOBER 30

The Director called and relayed information from Roanoke which had been given by Mr. L. F. Cooke. Conditions are about the same. Insufficient rain fell to be effective. There are now 10 Army men, 30 from University of Maine, and 10 from Angier on the fire. The overhauls in Legion Two and Great Smokies should be held on standby.

(October 17 - November 14, 1947)

OCTOBER 17

- 4:45 p.m. Report from Fire Chief Sleeper. Fire at Fresh Meadow. Need portable pump, hose and few men.
5:45 p.m. Dispatched fire truck, 2½ and 1½" hose, two pumps, tank truck and 6 men.

OCTOBER 18

- 12:00 Noon Park men released from fire. Chief Sleeper requests operators to be placed on standby. Equipment still on line. Fire controlled.

OCTOBER 20

- 10:00 a.m. Park equipment released by Chief Sleeper.

OCTOBER 21

- 8:00 a.m. Report from Sleeper, fire out of control and plenty of help needed. He has called fire companies and Dow Field. Park forces dispatched.
10:00 a.m. Army from Dow Field arrived in 10 vehicles, distributed on lines. Field camp near CCC Camp site Eagle Lake.
4:55 p.m. Report from Sawyer. Fire crossing Eagle Lake Road and entering park 3/4 mile west of Eagle Lake.
5:00 p.m. Superintendent Hadley called Richmond reporting the fire out of control and requested assistance.
5:40 p.m. Telephone call from Savage at Richmond. Superintendent Hadley received call and briefly outlined fire conditions. Hadley informed Savage that someone from the Regional Office was needed to share responsibility and help generally to direct suppression activities. Savage informed Hadley that he would leave by first plane available for Sawyer and expected to arrive at 11:00 a.m. tomorrow, but would advise arrival time before leaving Boston. Hadley advised sufficient equipment and manpower were available and that he would have a car meet the plane in Sawyer.

OCTOBER 22

- 9:00 a.m. Sawyer appointed Captain Ross of Aunt Betty Pond Section. Savage and Moore arrive Bar Harbor. Conference with Sleeper, Campbell, Hadley, Newell and Sawyer. Park and cooperating forces attempt to stop head near Aunt Betty Pond. Sleeper and forces on fire outside Park area.
1:45 p.m. Savage and Moore started burning out along carriage road Eagle Lake to Aunt Betty Pond. Approximately 30 Army, 10 park and local and 6 University of Maine students.

10:30 p.m. Savage called Region. Advised of situation. Expected to secure control by midnight or shortly after at 500 to 600 acres burned inside. Need 4 supervisors and 10 Cooks.

10:35 p.m. Savage called Arnal, Mammoth Cave. Gave status of fire.
11:30 p.m. Savage scouting fire west of Aunt Betty Pond with Thompson, Favour and Howick. Moore pushing line toward Aunt Betty Pond.

OCTOBER 23

6:30 a.m. Established field camp at intersection carriage roads at Gilmore Meadow. Effective liaison with Army. Fire Eagle Lake to Aunt Betty Pond under control and mop-up being pushed.
8:40 a.m. SW and west winds until tonight change to N., 20-mi mph.
9:00 a.m. Contact with Region inc. Situation favorable.
10:30 a.m. Mayo reports line along carriage road E. Mop-up progressing.
10:30 a.m. Bill Maxwell requests men for assistance fire threat to Hall's Cove.
11:00 Noon Contact with Region. Little change. Situation favorable.
1:00 p.m. Favour to take charge of crew on line west of Aunt Betty Pond and close to Eagle Lake Road.
1:30 p.m. Low Field No. 500G tank pumper arrived for mop-up along carriage road.
2:30 p.m. Report from P. Young. All OI on line from Aunt Betty Pond to Eagle Lake Road sector.
3:00 p.m. Field telephone installed at Field No. 9, Gilmore Meadow.
4:00 p.m. Savage called Hadley. Wind direction changed and velocity increasing rapidly. Situation approaching critical stage. Prepare for call reporting fire out of control.
4:00 p.m. Favour from Eagle Lake Road. Wind from N.-gale velocity. Breakover fire to west outflanking line and threatening men. Instructed to pull out and look to safety of men.
5:10 p.m. All men out of line. Fire over in several spots. Spurting. Headed out by carriage road toward Bubble Pond.
Cook and 4 men (Hargrave, P. L. Johnson, Jr. R. Johnson and Denton) arrived Bar Harbor via Seal Harbor. Fire on highest Mt., over Cadillac and headed toward Bear Creek.
5:30 p.m. Savage and Moore with men broke through fire to Bar Harbor. Fire sweeping southward.
10:30 p.m. Foster arrived Bar Harbor. Telephone out.
11:00 p.m. Foster instructed return mainland and report situation to Hickman. Savage will contact later.

OCTOBER 24

5:30 a.m. Meeting Park Director, Savage, Hadley, Cook, Moore, Howick, Favour. Savage appointed Fire Boss. Fire Boss set up following tentative organization: Cook - Relief Fire Roads; Moore - manpower, liaison Army; Favour - information and scouting; Douglas - equipment salvage and stock piles; Four men from Thornehill to assist in salvage of equipment; Campbell - liaison with Bar Harbor Fire Company; Cowling - communications; Mayo and Howick - Clerical, Timekeeper, etc.

- 6:00 a.m. Lts. Payne and Abbott assigned as Army liaison with Park Service.
- 9:00 a.m. Telegram: Chief Supervisor National Park Service, Acadia M., Bar Harbor, ME. HAVE AVAILABLE SUPPLY OF AXES WITH HAMMERS AND PEAVERS WITH HAMMERS ALSO SUPPLY OF SPARE HAMMERS THIS EQUIPMENT ALL NEW AND AVAILABLE TO ONE OF YOUR TRUCKS OR CHERNOVY FURNACE GROUP 24 HOURS A DAY DURING HOURS OF FIVE PM AND EIGHT AM CONTACT MR CASNER AT OCEANIC MARINE TELEPHONE 225. JOHN T CLARK PEAVY INC CO.
- 10:45 a.m. Conference held with Chief Supervisor at Fire House, Hadley, Cook, Savage, Peavoy and Campbell attending. Town in charge of fire north of Eagle Lake Road and east of state route 198. Park to handle all forest fire south of Eagle Lake. Will assist town when supervisory forces become available. Contact Region. Need 20 supervisory and equipment including six power axes, ten portable pumps, twenty miles fire hose, one hundred back pack pump, by air. Regional Forester Arnold and Walker if possible. Approval of expenditure of \$1000 for emergency purchases.
- 9:55 a.m. Foster called back to Acadia.
- 11:45 a.m. See telegram from John T. Clark Peavy Inc. Co., to Chief Supervisor regarding available supply of axes, peavays, etc.
- 12:30 p.m. 200 men to arrive from Dow at 5:00 p.m. (no equipment)
- 1:25 p.m. Sector A: Berg - Sector Bass and N. Johnson, Foreman, dispatched with Doudna as guide.
- 1:30 p.m. Local crew left fire house with pump unit.
- 1:35 p.m. Sector B: Norton, Sector Bass and Johnson, Foreman; Disp. with Nomach as guide, L. Cook, observer.
- Hadley: When Lt. (Linison) is ready to go with hose, H. Warren with a truck is at the garage.
- 1:55 p.m. Reported 13 men, 3 small pumps, 550' 1½" hose (Doudna).
- 2:00 p.m. Sector A.
- Foster returned to Acadia with Robertson. Stake truck, Chrysler pump, pump and hose and hand tools.
- 2:15 p.m. Hadley: 30 back pumps to be picked up at Rockland.
